GEORGE HARDENBROOK, who had run a farm six miles northwest of this place, and who was taken sick some two weeks ago with measles, which run into pneumonia, died Tuesday night at W. W. Cloyd's place, where he was taken sick. The funeral was conducted at Mr. Cloyd's home on Wednesday and the remains were interred in the J. H. Jackson cemetery. Charles Henry Harris was born at Hagerstown, Indiana March 17, 1850 and died at Lawton, Oklahoma July 14, 1925 at the age of 75 years, 3 months and 26 days.

He was the second son of Warren H. and Mary Susan Harris. Five other children graced his home. Wm. T., Mrs. Jennie Wills, Mrs. Henrietta Wilbauer, Edward and John J. of Ft. Wayne, Indiana the only surviving number of this family.

Mr. Harris came to Nebraska with his fathers household in 1871 and took a homestead, adjoining the city of Madison and also adjoining the cemetery which is to be his last resting place. He was married to Carrie S. Barney on New Years day 1873, and together began housekeeping on their homestead where they lived until their departure to Oklahoma about 15 years ago. To this union 3 children were born, Maude, Warren and Dick of which Dick is the only surviving child.

His remains shall rest in the family lot, in Crown Hill cemetery which originally was a part of his father's homestead. Source: Madison Star—Mail, July 23, 1925, page 1.

Reverend and Mrs. John Hotskin

In the spring of 1873, John Hotskin with his wife and several children left Harrison County, lowa for a homestead on the NE ¼ of section 4, Township 21, North, Range 3 West of the 6th prime meridian in Kalamazoo Township of Madison County, Nebraska. It was a hard trip over muddy and bridgeless roads in bad weather. A short distance south of Madison they encountered the terrific blizzard of Easter Day, April 14, 1873 but were lucky to find shelter at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Horsham. This storm lasted three days and nights. After the storm they continued on to the wild, unimproved prairie homestead. They found temporary shelter with a neighbor while preparing a dug out on their own land. Mrs. Cynthia Hotskin's brother, a Mr. James and his family came out at the same time and located on a nearby homestead.

In September of 1873, a son, Marion Hotskin, died after a protracted ailment. His father set apart a tract in the North East corner of his farm for a cemetery, now the Iowa Valley Cemetery, and Marion was the first one buried there.

John Hotskin was an ordained United Brethren church minister and a leader, not only in the religious activities, but also in promoting the social and material welfare of the lowa Valley community. He was an eloquent speaker and a fine singer. His wife was Cynthia Ann James an accomplished woman with a soprano voice. They held revival services, preached in homes, school houses and churches in (Burnett), St. Clair, Walnut Grove, Fairview, Looking Glass and other frontier localities. He had the ability to inspire hope and cheer where he appeared – a great benefit to depressed settlers during the grasshopper years in the middle seventies. He promoted the building of the lowa Valley church. His social service among the young people on the frontier effectively established a higher standard of morality in business and civic behavior.

The most lasting monument to Rev. Hotskin's memory was the founding of the Iowa Valley Cemetery Association on August 17, 1912. The incorporators were F. K. Panek, James Adamek,

Tom Panek, F. A. Franek, F. G. Dvorak, C. Olson and F. K. Pospisil. It is one of the prettiest country cemeteries.

Rev. John Hotskin was born in Sweden, became a sailor in his teens and located in Harrison County, Iowa, after the Civil War. In early manhood he became devoted to Christian work and was ordained minister of the gospel in the United Brethren church. In 1884, he moved with his family to Rock County, Nebraska, where he continued his Evangelistic work on a new frontier as long as his health held out. At the age of 89 he died in Rock County. Funeral services were held at the home in charge of the Methodist minister of Bassett. He was buried in the Iowa Valley cemetery, where services at the grave were conducted by Rev. C. W. Clifton of Meadow Grove, Nebraska. Mrs. Cynthia Ann Hotskin moved to Long Pine, Nebraska and lived there with her son, until her death in 1917. She too was buried in the Iowa Valley Cemetery. Their daugher Mary Hotskin married Charles Olson on December 8, 1878.
